THE BATTLE OF LEWES MEMORIAL

On Saturday 14th May 1966 a Memorial will be presented to the Borough of Lewes, in Sussex, to mark the 700th anniversary of the Battle of Lewes which was fought on 14th May 1264. It was the culmination of a long military and political struggle between Henry III and the rebel barons led by Simon de Montfort, and the decisive defeat of the king led to important advances towards a representative Parliament.

The battle itself was therefore of national significance, but the ceremony at Lewes is essentially of a local character. The Memorial is a gift to the people of the County Town from Sir Tufton Beamish M.C. who has been their Member of Parliament since he succeeded his father, the late Rear-Admiral Beamish, in 1945. The occasion marks his family's long and close association with the Borough, as well as his interest in the subject. Sir Tufton has made a study of the barons' rebellion, and his book Battle Royal (Frederick Muller 1965) which he dedicated to the People of Lewes, describes the events leading to the Battle of Lewes and the constitutional changes that followed.

The Priory of Saint Pancras, outside the walled town of Lewes, served as headquarters to the royalist army, and many men who fell in the battle were buried there by the Cluniac monks. The Memorial has appropriately been erected on a site in the grounds, near the ruins of the splendid buildings that were demolished in 1537 on the orders of Henry VIII by his nefarious minister, Thomas Cromwell. It incorporates the Cross, symbolising the part played by the English Church in the fight against a stubborn and despotic king, and a frieze carries eight scenes from the battle which were described by contemporary chroniclers. The main structure is sand cast in aluminium, and the frieze is cast by the cire-perdue method.

The work has been designed and executed by the Italian sculptor, Enzo Plazzotta, who studied in Milan at the Accademia di Brera under Giacomo Manzù. Mr. Plazzotta was one of the war-time leaders of the Italian Resistance Movement, and twice escaped ofter capture by the Germans. In 1947 he was commissioned by the Comitato di Liberazione to create a tribute to the members of the British Special Forces who co-operated with the Italian Resistance Movement. His bronze sculpture, which is entitled "Spirit of Rebellion" and represents a youthful David challenging Goliath, stands in the Special Forces Club in Herbert Crescent, London S.W.1. It was this task that brought Mr. Plazzotta to London, and he has lived and worked here since. He has a studio near the river in Chelsea. An Exhibition of his work opened in Paris on 3rd May this year at the Galeries des Anciens et des Modernes on the Left Bank, to coincide with the Festival des Arts.

HONORARY FREEDOM OF THE BOROUGH

It is important to distinguish between the Freedom of a Borough and the Honorary Freedom of a Borough.

Before 1835, the right to the Freedom of a Borough could be obtained by purchase or gift or could arise from birth, marriage or apprenticeship to a Freeman; much depended on the Charter and Custom of the Borough. In a number of Boroughs the right could not be transferred through the widows of daughters of a Freeman. Freemen formed part of the Corporation, were entitled to a share in the Corporate property and were exempt from Tolls and dues; they also had the right to vote at Parliamentary Elections. In some Boroughs they were, until 1832, the only electors.

In the reforms of the 1830's, the rights and privileges of the Freemen were severely curtailed and the Municipal Corporations Act of 1835 provided that no one should be admitted by gift or purchase. Subsequent claims have only been made on the grounds of birth, marriage or apprenticeship and, although there are a number of cities and towns where these claims still arise, and the ancient Freemen's Guilds have only a shadow of their former importance, there are no such Freemen of Lewes.

Since the Honorary Freedom of the Boroughs Act of 1885 (now the Local Government Act, 1933), it has been possible for a Borough Council to admit as Honorary Freemen, persons of distinction or persons who have rendered eminent services to the Borough. It is the greatest honour which a Borough can bestow; it is a right peculiar to a Borough and there is no similar privilege available to County or District Councils. It is an honour but it carries no right to share in Corporate property nor an exemption from tolls, dues and rates.

On the 28th January 1970, at a meeting of the Borough Council specially convened for the purpose, Alderman A. C. Barber, Colonel Sir Tufton Beamish, H. E. Parrish, Esq. and D. Whittington, Esq., were admitted as Honorary Freemen of the Borough.

To-day's ceremony, is a special meeting of the Borough Council convened for the express purposes of making presentations to these four eminent gentlemen. Each one will be presented with an illuminated address containing the appropriate Resolution of the Borough Council, together with a silver goblet to commemorate this important occasion in the history of Lewes.

It is appropriate to record that in the eighty-five years since the Borough Council obtained the right to admit persons to be Honorary Freemen, only nine admissions to the Roll were made prior to this year.

The Resolution of the Borough Council admitting as Honorary Freemen of the Borough, the persons in whose honour this meeting is called, is in the following terms:

"That in pursuance of Section 259 of the Local Government Act, 1933, the Council do hereby admit as Honorary Freemen of the Borough:

- (a) Alderman Arthur Charles Barber, in recognition and appreciation of the eminent services rendered by him to the Borough, particularly in the sphere of adult education in his capacity as the founder member in 1931, of the Lewes Branch of the Workers' Educational Association, of which he is at present Chairman; as a Governor, Manager and member of various educational bodies and other organisations; as a member of the Borough Council since 1954 (having been elected an Alderman in 1967 and served as Mayor of Lewes on three occasions); and as an expression of the high regard in which he is held in the Borough.
- (b) Colonel Sir Tufton Beamish, M.C., M.P., in recognition and appreciation of the eminent services rendered by him to the Borough, particularly as Member of Parliament for the Lewes Constituency since 1945, following a distinguished Military career; his practical interest in this ancient and historic County Town, Lewes Priory in particular; the many charitable and other organisations he actively supports; and as an expression of the high regard in which he is held in the Borough.
- (c) Hereward Eric Parrish, Esquire, J.P., in recognition and appreciation of the eminent services rendered by him to the Borough, particularly by the great practical interest taken by him in the youth of the Borough and many charitable and other organisations; membership of the Borough Council for over twenty-three years, including seventeen years as an Alderman and three years as Mayor; his service as a Magistrate and as Chairman of the Lewes Petty Sessional Division; and as an expression of the high regard in which he is held in the Borough.
- (d) Dick Whittington, Esquire, in recognition and appreciation of the eminent services rendered by him to the Borough, particularly his active participation and interest in the welfare of elderly persons and ex-servicemen; his support of numerous voluntary and charitable organisations; service as a member of the Borough Council for fourteen years, including eight years as an Alderman and one and a half years as Mayor, and as an expression of the high regard in which he is held in the Borough."
